Chapter Appoints Search Co-Chairs, Seeks Search Committee Members

In the next few weeks our search for a new dean will take a major step forward.

At its August meeting the Chapter named Ray McColgan and Judy Stark as co-chairs of the Search Committee. Ray is a past senior warden, current stewardship chair, member of the Friends of St. Aelred, usher, and coffee-hour host. Judy works as a consultant to dioceses that are seeking new bishops. She is also a past senior warden and current Chapter member, coffee hour host, and newsletter editor.

"I am honored that Chapter has asked me to co-chair the Search Committee for

our new dean," Ray said.
"I love our Cathedral and want it to continue to thrive, grow, and be open and affirming to all. Along with Judy (with whom I am thrilled to co-chair), I will diligently work to find the best candidate possible."

On September 3 we will post a nominating form at

This is a group of seven additional people who will oversee a survey of the congregation and conduct listening sessions, then write a profile, evaluate candidates, and discern whom to recommend to the Chapter as our next dean.

"This is an exciting time in our life as the Cathedral," Judy said. "I'm looking forward to working with a team representing the rich diversity of the congregation to envision our future."

Under our tentative schedule, we will post our profile in December and candidates will submit their applications to the bishop's office, which will review them and pass on potential candidates to the Search Committee early in 2024. Then the committee will conduct interviews, do reference checks, and invite finalists to visit us. We

expect to make a call in June 2024 and have our new dean in place by September.

Meanwhile, the Chapter continues in conversation with Bishop Scharf about appointing an interim dean.

At the request of the bishop, Chapter members agreed to extend their terms for a year — that is, all current members will serve an additional fourth year. We do this to provide stability and continuity during this time of transition. The Chapter did the same thing in 2008, at the request of then-Bishop Dabney Smith, when our former dean, Stephen Morris, was first called to St. Peter's. This means that there will be no Chapter elections at our Annual Meeting in January.

The Chapter also voted to increase security by having an off-duty St. Petersburg police officer stationed on Second Avenue N on Sundays and major holidays/events. This is a pilot program from now until the end of the year, at which time we'll revisit and evaluate it.

Education for Ministry Wants YOU!

Education for Ministry (EfM) is a fouryear, mentored, small-group program of theological reflection for lay people that is grounded in scripture and church history. It is not Bible study, though we do reflect on the Bible. The group at the Cathedral meets in person from 6 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. every Monday between Labor Day and Memorial Day.

A typical evening consists of a time for participants to share what's happening in their lives, prayer, discussion of the week's

readings, and a theological reflection. There are no quizzes, tests, or papers to write. There is a cost involved, and students have the opportunity to commit to only one year at a time.

This year, Michelle Thomas and Courtney McBaen will mentor the group, which consists of a minimum of 6 people. We have space for YOU! Interested? Contact Michelle Thomas (mthomas@spcathedral.com) for more information.

The Green Devils Pantry & Closet is organized and maintained by student "Closeteers" at St. Petersburg High School. Begun in 2006 with a \$500 grant, the GDP&C's mission is to provide food, clothing, and other needed items to the Green Devils family, no questions asked. "It is all about dignity and modeling benevolence."

We Got Campbell Park Off To a Great School Year, Sent Some Love to Peterborough

Much of the work in August of the Community Caring and Sharing Committee focused on Campbell Park Elementary School. Using checks and Walmart gift card donations from individual members and \$2,250 from the Committee's allocation, the Cathedral was able to sponsor all 31 classrooms at \$150 per classroom for the 2023-24 school year.


We also donated a carload of school uniforms, underwear, and socks, plus school supplies for the resource room, and hundreds of encouragement cards for the students signed by Cathedral members during July and early August coffee hours.

In response to an urgent request, we used \$500 of the Committee's allocation to purchase large-size uniform shorts, pants, and underwear.

Using a Thrivent Action Team grant, Cathedral members assembled and delivered 30 emergency bags to the Peterborough Apartments in early August. The bags include personal items, hygiene supplies, and food items to tide residents over during times when they may be unable to get out to shop. These bags are among the most appreciated items we supply to any of our community partners.

the Cathedral in October. This film-based dialogue series on race, grounded in faith, is an initiative of the wider Episcopal Church, part of a commitment to justice in our personal lives, ministries, and society. It involves two in-person meetings and eight biweekly Zoom sessions, from October through March.

The series draws on powerful documentary films and readings that focus on Indigenous, Black, Latino, and Asian/Pacific American histories as they intersect with European-American histories. It invites participants to unpack their own histories and experiences in a safe space. The 10 sessions cover a wide range of issues and challenges of race and racism in this country.

All are welcome, whether you are well-versed in these issues or are just beginning

Can I Get A Witness?

Perhaps the best way to understand the significance of Sacred Ground is to hear from one who has walked there,

as both participant and facilitator. Please enjoy the testimony of St. Peter's Cathedral member Kathy Coughlan:

About 10 years ago I attended a program at St. Luke's Cathedral in Portland, Maine. It was presented by descendants of the De-Wolf family of Bristol, RI, once the nation's most successful slave-trading family whose

ancestor, James DeWolf (1764-1837), was the second-weathiest man in the country.

The descendants showed the Emmy-nominated PBS film *Traces of the Trade*, documenting their family's involvement in the slave trade, in which contemporary family members vowed that they would make reparation in some way. One of the family members was Katrina Brown, an Episcopalian, who produced and directed the film and developed the Sacred Ground program.

I truly believe that I was led by the Holy Spirit to attend that program as it planted the seed of my

involvement with Sacred Ground, first as a participant and later as a facilitator. "It was life-changing" is a trite comment, but indeed, that was my experience! Having grown up in a middle-class neighborhood in New York, I was exposed to many cultures. I was quite certain that I knew a lot about the people around me. I thought that my education had taught me the history of slavery and about people of other nation-

alities who had come to the U.S. But I found that this was not so.

The Sacred Ground program is comprehensive in scope. The videos and testimonies are powerful. I had to face my own racism and white privilege, yet had the support of the group to acknowledge my own complicity, to grieve, and to make some reparations of my own. Sacred Ground stands out as one of the most important experiences I have had in my religious education.

Beloved Community Movie Night: Just Mercy

On Friday, October 13, at 5:30 p.m., we'll show *Just Mercy*, a film centered around themes of empathy, equity, hope, and resilience. The story follows

Harvard Law School graduate Bryan Stevenson's move to Alabama, where he recognizes an urgent need to provide free legal assistance to minorities who have been unfairly sentenced.



Stevenson ini-

tiated the National Memorial for Peace and Justice in Montgomery, AL, which honors the names of each of more than 4,000 African-Americans lynched in the 12 states of the South from 1877 to 1950. Our pilgrimage next April to the Civil Rights sites in Alabama includes a visit to the memorial.

FAST House Meetings Start to Identify Social-Justice Priorities

Two small-group meetings are on the schedule as members of FAST — Faith and Action for Strength Together — start the annual process of identifying the top social-justice issues that need action in Pinellas County.

What is FAST?

Faith and Action for Strength Together (FAST) is a justice-ministry organization of 50 religious congregations throughout Pinellas County that band together to create positive change in our community. FAST is a congregation-based 501(c)3 non-profit whose purpose is to train community residents from diverse congregations to work together to identify root causes of community problems and take action on these problems. Learn more at fast-pinellas.org.

St. Peter's is one of 50 faith communities that work together to prioritize the issues and develop solutions that will be presented to elected officials in the spring to win their support and improve the lives of Pinellas residents.

Last spring FAST

succeeded in gaining government support for pre-arrest diversion for non-dangerous driving offenses, improved water quality, and increased affordable housing.

A series of house meetings around the county in the weeks to come will bring together groups of 8 to 10 to talk about a new set of priorities. Issues that have surfaced in the past include early childhood care, juvenile criminal justice, senior



transportation, and mental-health access. Two meetings are scheduled for St. Peter's members and friends (see the box for dates and locations).

The ideas generated at the house meetings are then prioritized by FAST

members countywide, who spend months in research and analysis and in developing proposed actions that will be presented to elected officials at a public gathering in the spring.

When Things Go Wrong, Resurrection House Is There to Help

How many times have you had something go wrong at the worst possible moment?

Maybe your car broke down right before an important meeting. Or your phone died while you were waiting to hear back from a potential employer. For families experiencing homelessness, emergencies like these can be especially devastating. That's why, at Florida Resurrection House, we have an emergency fund to help families get through unexpected challenges.

Just the other day, one of our participants had finished her internship and was actively interviewing for jobs. Her cell phone, which was crucial for receiving callbacks, suddenly stopped working. It would have cost \$150 to repair, but she had no money to cover the expense. This could have spiraled into a major setback, but instead, our emergency fund was able to step in and provide the support she needed to get back on track.

By providing families with access to emergency funds, we're able to help prevent small



problems from turning into major crises. It's just one of the many ways we're working to end the cycle of poverty for single-parent families and create a brighter fu-

ture for families in the Tampa Bay area.


The Book Club Is Touring the National Parks from East to West


Vacation season isn't over! This month the St. Peter's Book Club will visit national parks from coast to coast.
